Journal from Juba (and Ampthill!)



Status October 2024: Honey and Home

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Maridi is a small town in the midst of forest known for its excellent honey. In recent separate visits, both John and I returned with 51 jerry cans full of this thick amber nectar. During my visit as part of a peace and reconciliation team, I met Pastor Elisama who was an active participant in the Healing Hearts, Transforming Nations workshop we were running for church leaders in the diocese. As a rural dean for the Episcopal Church of South Sudan, Pastor Elisama cares for 3000 people across five parishes. On the last day, my colleague Thomas Titus told me that Elisama had a story to tell me. He began by taking of his jacket and showing me his left arm. It was so badly broken it looked like he had an extra joint between his shoulder and elbow. He was in constant pain and described it as feeling loose. Two years ago, deep in the forest and many miles from home, a branch gave way whilst he was high up in a tree whilst harvesting honey (photo of traditional hive right, middle), which is the way he earned money to help feed his family and pay their school fees. He fell to the forest floor. By the time he regained consciousness, it was early evening. The walk home in the dark injured and on foot took many hours. Treatment locally failed and eventually he resigned himself to the immobility and pain of his arm. Thomas and I prayed with him and I left Maridi deeply moved by his situation and wondered if MAF could be part of the answer to our prayers that day. So I took his story back to the team at the MAF office.

The following week, my MAF colleague Jaap arranged for Elisama to be on a flight to Juba for medical investigation, saving him the discomfort of a two day journey by road. MAF were able to help Elisama arrange an operation to realign the bones and secure them with plates and screws.

Elisama is now recovering and is so thankful for the help, healing and hope MAF have helped to provide. He says: 'I benefitted the most from the [peace and reconciliation] training because I received healing twice - not only did I receive spiritual healing from the MAF training, but I got physical healing too!' He's looking forward to being back home pastoring his people.

In August, I spent a week in Maridi as part of the team facilitating on the Healing Hearts Transforming Nations workshop for about 90 pastor couples (180 people in total, more than 3 times as many people we usually host the workshop for!), representing nine different ethnic groups. One pastor, in closing said, 'I have war in my heart for so long, But last night, there was no war in me.'

Flooded

During our time in the UK, Bedfordshire – where we were based – faced unprecedented flooding with a local main road turning into a river and being closed for almost 2 weeks causing much disruption. The emergency services supported people in trouble and insurance companies picked up the tab for many as the water subsided and normal life resumed. Meanwhile in South Sudan, floods have now affected over 1 million people across 41 counties, and causing 25% of them to be displaced as they seek higher ground (OCHA), making it one of the worst flood seasons that the nation has experienced in recent decades. Four organisations and four flights help one beautiful baby



Recently, MAF alongside four amazing partner organisations exmplified what it means to work together to help a baby in a remote location. Three months ago, EVERY VILLAGE met baby Nyandit in a village and arranged for her to receive a blood transfusion at the hospital in Tonj run by IN DEED AND TRUTH (IDAT). She, along with her mother Monika were then brought on a MAF flight with an IDAT doctor who ensured her vitals were strong during the After medical assessments in Juba at the flight. USRATUNA CENTER, she was referred for life-saving treatment in Uganda. Thanks to a partnership between Usratuna, MAF and the CURE Uganda, Nyandit and her mum were able to take another flight with MAF along with seven other babies, this time down to Uganda for pioneering procedure performed by the amazing team at

the CURE UGANDA children's hospital there. Nyandit received aftercare back in Juba and has now bene flown back to Tonj, reunited with her family in the village. This is all possible because of YOUR support of MAF – thanks so much for beign part of the team. What a great reminder of how we can have life transforming impact when we work in partenrship. ELECTION UPDATE: The government of South Sudan have announced a further delay of 2 years to the elections originally timetabled for December 2024. Whilst this is a relief in some ways, it reflects the lack of progress by institutions towards the peace process.

We are so thankful for your prayers for us, this work and this nation. May His kingdom come, His will be done.
