Let's get crafty

Because one-third of Bangladesh is covered with water, MAF uses a very special plane. It's called an amphibious Cessna Caravan and can be used on land and water. Some people call it a floatplane because that's what it does!

This has given Alpha an idea. Why not have a go at making your own floatplane with him? As it's a little bit tricky, we suggest you follow the steps below with an adult.

You will need:

3 corks, **4** cocktail sticks, **2** lolly sticks and **3** matchsticks, scissors and glue, a small piece of foil, paint and pens (optional), clear nail varnish (if you want to waterproof your design).

- » Cut 1 lolly stick to make 2 tail pieces
- » Wrap the matchsticks in foil
- » Paint your pieces (or not!)
- Use the sharp end of the cocktail sticks to make holes in the corks
- » Trim the cocktail sticks and attach the floats to the body
- » Glue on the wings, tail and propellers
- » Decorate your plane in MAF style.

If you decide to land your aircraft on water, we can't promise it will float without nosediving!
